Understanding Your Child's Report Card

As your child's first teacher, you are an important partner in your child's education. Communication about your child's progress is ongoing throughout the year through phone calls, emails, Edsby messages, and meetings. In addition, you will receive report cards three times throughout the school year in November, February, and June. The purpose of these reports is to offer feedback that is clear, meaningful, and timely to support your child's learning.

What will you see?

On the Kindergarten report cards there will be teacher comments.

The comments in the Communication of Learning reflect what your child says in class and the learning they show. The comments are divided into four areas: Belonging & Contributing, Self-Regulation & Well-Being, Demonstrating Literacy & Mathematics Behaviours and Problem Solving & Innovating. The teacher and early childhood educator (ECE) work together on the Communication of Learning.

On the Grade 1 to 8 report cards (February & June), there will be a grade/mark and comments.

Your child's grade/mark is determined by their teacher and reflects what your child says in class, and the learning they show. The grade/mark reflects your child's level of achievement which they are most regularly demonstrating.

Comments are designed to provide feedback on your child's strengths and next steps for improvement.

- o **Page 1 Learning Skills and Work Habits** –This section tells you how your child's everyday actions and attitudes will support them in being successful in school.
- o **Page 2 & 3 Subject Areas** –The information provided gives you a picture of how your child is progressing in this subject, showing what they're doing well and their next steps for improvement. Parents/guardians are encouraged to talk with the teacher to support your child's next steps.

For parents/guardians of SK, Grade 1 and Grade 2 Students:

There's a section called **Early Reading Screening (ERS)** (below from SK: Page 2, Grade 1 & 2: Page 3). To help your child improve in reading, teachers will use a tool that checks important early reading abilities. For the report cards in February and June, you will notice the 'N/A' (Not Applicable) box is checked because this screening will not begin until September 2024.

Understanding Your Child's Report Card

On page 3 of the February and June Grade 1-8 report cards, you will see a chart outlining the grade/mark.

A- to A+ 80-100	Level 4: Your child has shown that they are strong in certain areas and have a good grasp of specific skills. This doesn't mean they are learning things above their current grade level.
B- to B+ 70-79	Level 3: Students achieving at this level will be ready for the next grades and the learning that comes with them.
C- to C+ 60-69	Level 2: To be successful, students performing at this level will need to focus on the next steps in learning provided through ongoing feedback and as shared in the report card.
D- to D+ 50-59	Level 1: The student must demonstrate significant improvement if they are to be successful.
Level R Below 50	Level R: Specific strategies are needed to support the student's learning needs for them to be successful.
I -Insufficient Evidence	I: The teacher currently does not have enough information to provide a grade/mark.

There will be one overall grade/mark for each report period (1 or 2) in Language and Mathematics along with comments.

The "N/A" box may be checked on your child's report card because there was no instruction in that subject (i.e. The Arts).


